Community-Oriented Policing

philosophy which promotes partnerships between law enforcement and community members to proactively address public safety issues

Police Legitimacy

ability of police to be trusted by citizens to be lawful and unbiased

Problem Solving

application of appropriate resources to correct or improve conditions

Patrol Officer

officer who monitors an assigned area and provides the bulk of daily policing needs

School Resource Officer

officer who works in educational settings to prevent juvenile delinquency, deter criminal activities and act as positive role models

Neighborhood Service Officer

officer who performs a variety of functions to proactively keep order, such as code enforcement, traffic and crowd control, park security, animal control and parking enforcement

Crime Prevention Officer

officer who develops and implements crime prevention and community relations programs

Public Information Officer

officer who is responsible for disseminating information to the general public, media and community agencies and organizations
