Goal: To distinguish among the various types of financial aid and explore the process used to apply for financial aid.

Description: Many students need financial aid in order to attend institutions of higher learning, but not everyone understands the various types of financial aid available. This presentation analyzes the costs associated with higher learning and describes financial aid opportunities such as grants, scholarships, student loans and work-study programs. The process used to apply for financial aid is discussed as well.

1. To analyze the costs associated with attending an institution of higher learning.
2. To distinguish among the various types of financial aid.
3. To describe the processes used to apply for financial aid.

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Lesson Plan

Class 1: Begin class by passing out the *Formulas for Career Success: Financial Aid Vocabulary Handout and Worksheet*. Students should use these as references during the presentation. Show *Formulas for Career Success: Financial Aid - Types of Aid*. Follow the segment with its *Assessment*. Have students complete the *Types of Aid Activity*. Before the end of class, introduce the *College Budget Project* for students to begin for homework.

Class 2: Remind students to continue using the *Vocabulary Handout and Worksheet*. Show *Formulas for Career Success: Financial Aid - Applying for Aid*. Follow the segment with its *Assessment*. Have students begin the *Filling Out the FAFSA Activity*. Students should finish the *Activity* for homework. If time allows, have students continue working on the *College Budget Project*.

Class 3: Administer the *Formulas for Career Success: Financial Aid Final Assessment*. Have students finish the *College Budget Project*.

Types of Aid

Directions:

Working with a partner, students will compare and contrast the four types of financial aid discussed in the presentation. They should use the chart provided and fill in every space. Students may use outside sources if needed, but they should list sources according to your instruction.

Filling Out the FAFSA

Directions:

Students will fill out a printed copy of the most recent FAFSA. Encourage them to get guidance from parents and/or counselors if needed, but do not allow them to use a paid service for assistance. Students have the option to submit the completed FAFSA depending on their age and situation.



Project

College Budget

Directions:

Students will consider a higher learning institution they are interested in attending and will create a budget for one year of attendance at this institution. They will research the cost of tuition and fees; room and board; books and supplies and general living expenses. Students should be specific in their budgets and provide details concerning each category. They should NOT use the general statistics provided in the presentation. Have them document their sources according to your instruction. For extra credit, students may research forms of financial aid provided by the institution and write a short report describing the aid and what they must do to qualify for it.
